

FREEDOM OF INFORMATION ACT 2000

Your request for information has now been considered and the Council's response to your question is shown below.

I would like to obtain an address list of the empty homes that are known by the council and when they were first added to the system

The attached spread sheet contains the information that the Council believes it is lawfully able to disclose in response to this request. This details all empty residential properties in Leicester City that are not owned by individuals.

Should you wish to re-use this information you will need to apply for Re-Use of Public Sector Regulations (SI 2005 No. 1515).

A couple of points to bear in mind about the data provided:

1. The data is constantly changing - what is vacant on a Monday may become occupied on a Tuesday, so please remember it will always be in a state of flux.
2. Our data is only as accurate as the information notified to us; therefore it is possible we have inaccurate information if we have not been correctly advised.
3. We always need time to process work, therefore there may be changes notified to us that we had yet to action, which will affect the status of the properties on the list.

Some information, specifically the details of privately-owned domestic properties have been withheld under the following exemptions:

I can confirm that Leicester City Council holds this information. This information is exempt under section 40 (personal information) of the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA), as the information constitutes third party data. Section 40(2) provides that personal data about third parties is exempt information if one of the conditions set out in section 40(3) is satisfied. Under the FOI Act disclosure of this information would breach the fair processing principle contained in the Data Protection Act (DPA), where it would be unfair to that person/is confidential. Addresses alone have been considered personal data because of the likelihood of identification of the owner, and because it says various things about the owner.

This information is also considered to be exempt under section 31(1)(a) of the Freedom of Information Act and is therefore being withheld. Disclosure of the requested list of properties would be likely to have significant negative impact on the prevention of crime. Disclosure of this information could be of use to squatters and would, on a balance of probability, lead to significant harm in the form of criminal activity.

The Council considers there is a strong public interest in avoiding likely prejudice to the prevention of crime, including avoiding damage to property and personal distress to the victims of crime and to those in the wider neighbourhood. On balance the public interest in maintaining the exemption does outweigh the public interest in disclosure (which include properties coming back into use and the ability to review the Council's activities).

Having considered the public interest, the Department's decision is therefore to withhold details of privately-owned domestic properties. Please treat this document as the statutory refusal notice for the exempt information as required by section 17.1 of the Freedom, of Information Act 2000 for the reasons stated directly above.

The legislation allows you to use the information supplied for your own personal use. Please be aware that any commercial or other use, for example publication, sale, or redistribution may be a breach of copyright under the Copyright, Designs and Patents Act 1988 as amended unless you obtain the copyright holder's prior permission.

Not all the information that is supplied which is covered by copyright will be the Council's copyright, for example it may be the copyright of a government department or another Council. You should seek either the Council's consent or their consent as appropriate. The Council is willing to advise you of any such potential issues on request. 
