## FREEDOM OF INFORMATION ACT 2000

Your request for information has now been considered and the Council's response to your questions is shown below.

## You asked:

I would like to know why Network Rail gets an exception for using bus lanes within your remit.

## **ANSWER**

Network Rail approached the Council to seek permission for their liveried vehicles to be able to use Leicester's bus lanes whilst responding to an emergency, such as bridge strike or derailment on their network. As using a bus lane is a Criminal as well as Civil offence, the Council discussed the request with the Chief Constable and both parties agreed that such an exemption would be acceptable.

I would also like to know which vehicles/types of vehicles get the exception.

In relation to bus lanes, the exemption is for buses (vehicles over 10 seats), hackney carriages, cycles, emergency service vehicles, network rail vehicles described in (1) and certain other vehicles required to be in or drive through a bus lane for operational reasons (see 4 and 5)

I also want to know if this applies to subcontractors of Network Rail.

The exemption applies to a Network Rail liveried vehicle, it does not matter whether the driver is directly or in-directly employed by Network Rail.

I also want to know which vehicles get the exception for Leicester City Council.

Leicester City Council vehicles that have been exempted in addition to our bus fleet are City Highways Vehicles operationally required to carry out our Statutory Duty to maintain the roads, (gulley cleaning, road gritting, highways repairs and maintenance) and also Cleansing vehicles operationally required to carry out our Statutory Duty to clean the Highway, (road sweeping, litter bin emptying).

Apart from Hackney registered vehicles, buses and cycles, emergency vehicles and authorised vehicles belonging to Leicester City Council and Network Rail, are there any other vehicles (types or belonging to certain businesses) that receive an exception for using your bus lanes.

The City Council has a contract with JC Decaux for the supply and maintenance of our bus shelters, therefore, certain JC Decaux vehicles are

permitted to use the bus lanes whilst undertaking shelter maintenance works (cleaning, repairs etc)
